4	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: All
5	right. I'll go ahead and call the Park Place
6	Circle Drain Board of Determination to order.
7	And I want to thank everybody for Zooming
8	in. Typically, these are in person. But being the
9	situation, which Steve Koski, who is with us today,
10	will go into detail of the executive order on why
11	we're via Zoom, but I would much rather have it
12	face-to-face and in person. But this is what we
13	have today.
14	So I appreciate taking the time this
15	morning to learn about Park Place Circle and a
16	little bit about some of the issues from an
17	engineering report that will be later and kind of
18	why we're here today.
19	Again, I'm Joe Bush, the Water Resources
20	Commissioner, also known as the Drain Commissioner.
21	The name got changed in 2013 to Water Resources,
22	which I think it fits the job much better so for
23	what our responsibilities are.
24	This is just a little portion of what I
25	do, and it's having public hearings, which are

called Board of Determinations, which was a 1 2 petition from either the people or the city or 3 municipality. And we received a petition from the 4 City of Ferrysburg for some possible improvements 5 over in this particular area. And that will be in 6 the engineering report later. But I receive a 7 petition. It is my job as the elected official or Water Resources Commissioner to hold a public 8 9 hearing, and that is what everybody got invited to. 10 Today's determination isn't a cost, it 11 isn't a project, and it isn't really a lot except 12 is there a necessity for me to move forward as your 13 Water Resources Commissioner on a project. 14 Now, that being said, we do overnotice. 15 Some people are going to have some questions. 16 Number one, maybe I'm not in the district. But we 17 didn't redefine the district to a T yet. We overnoticed just in case, legally, we make sure we 18 19 got everybody. If we go overnotice and you're not 2.0 in, a bonus; right? But we want to make sure we 21 try to capture everybody who's in the watershed. 22 A drain district is a watershed. If your 23 water runs to a certain area and you benefit or 24 contribute, that's the only way that we have these

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petitions, basically via drain code, then we invite

people for a public hearing.

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This is the second step for the process.

First step is for me to receive it, a petition. We did that from the city. Second thing is hold a public hearing and have testimony from people who either have flooded or have no flooding or just kind of curious what it's about.

So today we don't have a cost. We don't have a project. And the Board of Determination has no -- these three board members I picked today, which are appointed by me, they are not on the city council, they have no relationship to any properties in the drain district, nor do they have any -- they don't live in the city of Ferrysburg. So they have no affiliation with this project as far as property owners or pay taxes. And this is why the drain code allows me to appoint a three-panel board that have, again, no affiliation with this area. So that's, again, another part of the process.

Once I do introductions, I give an oath, and the three-panel board runs the meeting. I will be here to answer questions, but they'll pick a chair and they will run the meeting. So what that means is I don't have a say in it whether it moves

forward or not, which is state law. Which I don't want a decision-making in that. That's why we appoint people to make that decision.

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These three panel board members have a lot of experience in drainage. They're usually either a township supervisor, a township manager, a road commission maybe engineer. But these three panel members I picked today are very, very familiar with drain code, state law, drainage, and how this process works. That's very important. So they're very experienced in what they're doing today.

And, again, I don't go and explain this to the individuals or the board members. This is for public testimony. That's why -- that's why we're having today's board meeting.

Also, you know, going into this, make sure you speak -- when you speak up, speak loudly and clearly with a name, address, and your concern because Suzanne, who is on our Zoom, is a court recorder, and I do this for every single Board of Determination meeting I have since I got elected back in 2012 and started in 2013. I court record these every single time. You'd be amazed what comes up later where I can go back and find what I

said or what somebody else said. So it's very helpful to have her.

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That is not required by law, I do that to protect the people and the city and myself and make sure it's court recorded just to make sure that things are legit and not just made up and words are put in that shouldn't be. So we try to be very transparent.

The other part is we also -- I'm trying to look on the Zoom here. There's too many windows with too many people on my screen. But I'm sure there will be a representative from the township -- or not township. Well, maybe. Spring Lake is in this one too. But City of Ferrysburg, I think Craig Bessinger might be in there as well to give any public comments.

So at this time I'm going to go ahead and give the oath and let these three gentlemen raise their right hand. And once they accept the oath, they will be running this meeting. And then if there's any questions, I'll forward those questions to the board, and then they will forward those questions to whoever needs to answer them.

So I thank you again for attending this meeting.

Well, I quess before you raise your 1 2 hands, I'll go ahead and give introductions. 3 We have Larry Bruursema, and then we have 4 Bill Cargo, and then we have Rich VanderKlok. And, 5 again, these three gentlemen have no affiliation with this drain district as far as living or 6 7 properties there or pay taxes there. And then we have Paul Forton. He is from 8 9 Spicer Group. He is the engineering firm I picked 10 to kind of do the delineation and look over the 11 pictures, look over the site, and kind of give an 12 idea for our presentation today. 13 And then our court recorder is Suzanne. 14 And I'm going to see here if there's 15 I got my panel, and I don't know if anybody else. 16 there's more. Let me go back to the other page. 17 Steve Koski is an attorney. He is with the law firm that we use. So he will be able to 18 19 answer questions as well. And via Zoom with the 2.0 executive order I think it's important that --2.1 yeah, Steve will give introductions, or an 22 introduction to himself, and why he's involved. So 23 he'll do that shortly. 24 Or, Steve, do you want to do that now

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before I give the oath?

1 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Sure. Yeah, I can 2 do that. 3 Again, my name is Steve Koski, and I am 4 an attorney with Fahey, Schultz, Burzych, Rhodes. 5 And, again, welcome to the Board of Determination 6 meeting. 7 This meeting is being held electronically 8 in compliance with the Governor of Michigan's 9 executive orders; there's been several of them. 10 The most recent executive order provides for 11 electronic meetings under the Open Meetings Act 12 during the duration of the public health emergency 13 related to COVID. 14 We will make every effort to ensure full 15 participation and transparency for those in 16 attendance. For each vote we recommend that the 17 board does a roll call vote just to make sure that 18 everybody is clear who's voting which way, 19 especially when there's not a unanimous vote. 2.0 With respect to those of you from the 21 public that are in attendance, we ask that you 22 remain muted during the meeting. And you may get 23 unmuted by me, especially if you're giving comment. After you give comment, I probably will mute you if

you don't do it. We just want to avoid too many

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open mics on at the same time because they pick up noise, and then it makes it hard for everybody to hear.

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And, as Joe mentioned, we have a court recorder. So either the court reporter or us will kind of step in if something isn't clear just to make sure that it is in the record and make sure that we fully get what you were trying to say.

For the public comment portion, the chairperson or I will facilitate this by calling on each person that would like to speak. And when you do that we ask that you state your name and address for the record. And the board will set rules after they elect their chair and secretary as to what those rules for public participation will be.

In order to indicate you would like to comment, if you haven't used Zoom before, or if you have, there's an option to raise your hand. And so if you're on a computer or a device, you can go to either the -- the participant list, to the bottom right of that there is a raise your hand option.

Or if you go near your name, scroll over your name on the participant list, you can select raise your hand. And so when you do that there will be a little blue hand that appears on the participant

list, so I will know who would like to participate.

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raise your hand.

If you're calling in by telephone, you can also indicate you would like to participate by dialing star 9, and that will raise your hand.

Also if you're on your phone you can dial star 6 to mute and unmute yourself. Everybody else has a mute button that you'll see on your computer or device. But, again, it's star 6 if you are on a

phone to mute and unmute yourself and star 9 to

There also is a chat function that you'll see on the bottom, there's a chat button, and you can only send messages to me, the host. And I welcome you to do that if you're having any issues that I can help you with. But also, when it comes time for public comments, you can, if you don't want to participate by giving your comment, you can place it in there. I would just ask that you put your name and address with your comment.

Otherwise, I won't be able to read that into the record.

If you experience any connection issues and you're connected by computer or device, we recommend that you just try leaving and reconnecting to the meeting. Usually that solves a

lot of issues, either audio or visual issues. And 1 2 if that still doesn't work, then we would recommend 3 that you call into the meeting using the call-in 4 information. 5 And for the board members, same thing. 6 Obviously, we will -- if somebody drops off, we 7 will pause the meeting and wait for that person to reconnect. And if they still can't reconnect by 8 9 their device, then they can call into the meeting 10 as well, and so we will be able to proceed that 11 way. 12 And I will go over -- prior to the public 13 comment portion, I will go over the procedures for 14 that, again, of how you can participate. 15 So at this time I will turn it back over 16 to Joe. 17 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thanks a 18 lot, Steve. So we're going to briefly get everybody acquainted with the location of where this particular issue is. We're going to talk about a little bit of the background and history. Joe Bush already mentioned the drainage district boundary. Another name for that is the watershed boundary, and a third name for that is a special assessment district, and we're going to talk a little bit about that.

I have a few photos of some of the site conditions from an inspection that we completed, and then I'll be taking any questions that the board may have after that time.

So, Steve, if you could go on to the next slide.

So our general location map here, you can see the red star. We are on the west side of the city of Ferrysburg north of Grand Haven.

And moving on to the next slide, zooming in a little, to discuss the background or history, Joe mentioned that this is an application for a brand-new drain. That's different than an application for a petition to do work on an existing drain.

So I know I've worked with several of you board members before. Keep in mind that this is a new drain, so it's a little bit different than a drain that's already been established.

Our watershed is approximately 150 acres. I say approximately because we don't have a centerline yet because this is a new drain. We have ideas on where it may go. And with that we've delineated about a 150-acre watershed, but that has yet to be determined.

In that watershed there are approximately 320 parcels. The land use within this particular district, we have a mixture of residential and then also park ground. And really why we're here today is severe flooding that occurs in Coast Guard Park and then in some of the surrounding neighborhoods.

And so moving on, Steve, to the next slide, we have a little bit closer version here. If you're not familiar with the area, Coast Guard Park is the large open grassy space that you see in the trees near the west side of the boundary, and the watershed boundary is shown in red. For those of you not familiar with this type of work, that watershed boundary is basically the edge of the bathtub where, if it rains in land in this

particular area, it all drains down to one central point. And so this is the approximate watershed boundary that we feel contributes water to this area during storm events.

It's also important to note at this time, if you missed it, Joe mentioned earlier that we did overnotify for this. And so if you're sitting in the audience and listening to this and thinking, well, I'm not even in that boundary, the reason could be that we did overnotice because we don't know exactly where our outlet will be. And because of that we want to bring in more folks to ensure that they're involved in this process.

And so moving on to the next slide, in order to determine that watershed boundary we use what's called LiDAR data. And this is basically elevation data that is obtained via flying an airplane over the surface of the earth, and they shoot sensors down, and it sends a beam back, simplistically, and gives the elevation of the earth. And so in our office we are able to take that and kind of ride the ridge lines around.

So this is a colorized picture of what the elevation is of the earth in this area. And you'll notice that there's not only colors, but

there's contour lines as well. And any time those contour lines are very close, it's an indicator that we have a steeper slope in that location.

And so if you find the label for

North Shore Drive, it's in the middle of the screen slightly below dead center -- thank you, Steve -- that particular area, you can see just north of there along that red line there's a lot of very steep contours. And that is essentially what we're looking for when we define these watershed boundaries and these district boundaries. And basically it's the continental divide per se that surrounds this particular area and delineates what water flows into this area and what water flows out.

What's unique about this particular watershed -- and many of the residents listening are familiar with this but for the board's benefit -- this particular watershed drains to Coast Guard Park. And that you can see in the flat -- again, I'll point back to that North Shore Drive call-out for the road. Slightly north of that you can see that the contours are very -- are separated out quite a bit, and that is where the baseball fields are. If you're familiar with

Coast Guard Park, in the large flat area, that basically serves as the low point for all the water in this locale to drain to and then it sits. It does not have a gravity outlet.

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One of the biggest challenges we're facing right now coming into this year especially is the high groundwater table. Not only is Lake Michigan and Huron and the Great Lakes near or at all-time highs, we're also seeing that in our groundwater throughout the state. For many folks if you have a sump pump, for example, it's been running more frequently in general through the last year or so because of these high groundwater tables. What that means, though, for areas like this where historically that water may have had a chance to infiltrate, with the groundwater being up, it cannot do that as quickly. And this has been a chronic problem, as I understand it.

I'm sure we'll take public comments as well, but in talking with several folks, this has been a chronic problem over the years where water will collect in this area, and it just stagnates and sits.

And so moving on to the next slide, I want to get into some of the pictures that were

taken. This is on May 18th on Park Place Circle.
And you can see the standing water in the road

3 | there.

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Interestingly enough, as I understand it -- and maybe some residents can confirm this later in public comments -- but there's a catch basin that's in the curb line of the road. And that had been sandbagged shut in hopes, I believe, of storing water in the road because there was so much water in the rear lots -- and we'll see that here in a little bit -- that they were trying to at least keep some of the water in the road area so that it didn't further inundate the rear lots drainage for these folks.

And moving on to the next photo, this is a picture behind those same homes around the corner. You can see in the far background there there's standing water below the decks. And this is the beginning of ponding water that occurred throughout this area with that May 18th storm.

The inspection that you'll see here in the photos that I have are limited to what I could see from the road. And so I believe there were other photos that were sent to the drain office, or Joe's office, that shows a little bit more flooding

out those rear lots. Once again, my photos were limited to primarily windshield tour. But you can see the extent of the flooding behind impacting several of the homes here.

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Moving on to the next slide, this is a photo of Coast Guard Park. It's generally facing in an easterly direction. And you can see that a significant portion of the park is flooded, the eastern portion of that. This standing flood water extended all the way to those homes off of Park Place Circle, and so quite a large area storing that stormwater. Many times that's a good thing. Unfortunately, with the excess amounts, you know, that stormwater has to go somewhere and we like to store it, but once we're in and near homes like this, it really truly becomes a problem.

Moving on from Coast Guard Park on to the next slide, this is a picture of the northeast corner of Parkwood and Mohawk. You can see that this is the parking area that services the buildings there on our left completely inundated with water. There's a pump there to the right of the green chair trying to remove that water and get that out of the system.

Again, this is another place that's a low

point that collects water, and, unfortunately, it does not have a place to go when that storm -- when the storm is this intense and we get this volume of water.

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So moving on to the next photo now, this is a picture of the same area coming from the other direction. And you can see not only is it impacting the parking area but also the structures and buildings themselves with standing water up against the building.

And so you will -- I'm hopeful that there are folks from the public that might be able to comment about their experience through this particular storm and even prior to that.

One thing I would like to note. You know, many people, "Well, what are you going to do?" What are you going to do?" And I'd like to just reiterate a comment that Joe made. This is a very preliminary part of the process. We don't even have survey data yet. We have no easements for where this drain is going to go yet. That all comes later on in the process after a determination is made today.

And so, I guess, moving on, and kind of a nice seque to the next slide, you know, as far as

next steps, it's important to note today is about necessity; whether something is necessary or not. That is what the board will be determining. If they decide that it is not necessary, there will not be a project, at least through the jurisdiction of Joe Bush's office. And the drain code or the law describes the fact that no new petition may be submitted to establish a new drain for a period of one year after a no necessity vote is cast for a Board of Determination.

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Now, moving on to the next slide, if the project is found necessary, then we do start pursuing the options for or solutions for the problem. So that's when we would get into the survey, which leads to the engineering and the final design of a potential solution. At that point we would approach property owners, potentially, for any easements that we may need in order to implement that design.

Presumably, with a project like this, we anticipate that permitting will be necessary. We need to bid the project. It's a public project, so it would go out to bid. And there's quite an extensive process through the drain code and the law that we need to follow in order to do that.

After that bidding is complete, then we have what's called a day of review. And many folks will ask, "Well, how do we find out what happened? And what's going to happen? And how much is this going to cost? And what is my portion of that going to be?" And I'd like to address that right now if it's okay with the board. That's the day that you find that out. So your next notice that you would receive for your next meeting would be a notice for a day of review. And that is a time where you can come in and review what your portion of the overall project cost would be and see kind of where that landed. Everything up to that point is really at the jurisdiction of Joe's office. At that point he is the one that will determine the scope. We will work with the city, obviously, and make sure that they are on board with any potential solutions, as well as the landowners.

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And then after that day of review is complete and that process is finished, then we can finally move on to construction.

And so I know that there are a lot of passionate folks when you have flooding like this and would like to see this process move very quickly. With the items detailed here, especially

involving, potentially, permits from EGLE and 1 2 things like that, that process tends to take three 3 to six months in order to complete. 4 It's very important to note that this is 5 not something that's going to happen overnight. 6 The process can start now, but, generally speaking, 7 you're really looking at most likely at least a year before this is complete. And when easements 8 9 are involved and permitting is involved it many 10 times takes longer. So this is not an 11 instantaneous solution, unfortunately, but it's a 12 start, potentially, down that road. 13 And so at this time I would take any 14 questions that the board may have. I know I've 15 worked, again, with several of you before. And 16 perhaps I've left some pertinent information out. 17 Certainly feel free to ask questions at this time. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Are there 18 19 any questions from the Board of Determination 2.0 members? I have none. 2.1 BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDERKLOK: T have 22 none either. 23 BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I have 2.4 none. You've done a very good job. 25 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Again,

we're going to begin taking some public testimony, 1 2 but prior to that, the first thing I want to do is 3 to see if there is anybody from the City of 4 Ferrysburg that wants to make any comments 5 regarding this proposed drainage district. 6 CITY MANAGER CRAIG BESSINGER: Joe, I 7 have no comments, but if anybody has a question, I'd be glad to answer them. 8 9 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That was 10 Craig Bessinger. 11 One of the things I think I need to do 12 and probably everybody needs to do is when we speak, first identify ourselves. It makes it 13 14 easier for the court reporter, and that would be 15 helpful. 16 Second thing: Is there anybody from the 17 Spring Lake Township who would like to comment as 18 far as the organization? 19 So nobody from Spring Lake Township. 2.0 At this time, then, I'm going to begin 2.1 taking public comments. 22 I'm going to ask that Steve Koski kind of 23 control who comes up. I will remind everybody to 24 give your name and address.

What we are doing for this Board of

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Determination is determining necessity; in other 1 2 words, is there a problem, and is the problem 3 significant enough to affect people's health, their 4 welfare, their property values. And if there is, 5 that's all we're going to determine today, that 6 there is a necessity for something to be done to 7 correct issues that affect people's public health, 8 public welfare, or their properties. 9 At this stage, Steve, could you take over 10 being the gatekeeper and having people step into 11 the public arena for public comments? 12 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Yes. Thank you, 13 Mr. Chair. 14 Again, just a reminder before we start 15 the public comments. If you would like to indicate 16 you have a comment, please select the raise your hand option which you can find when you select the 17 18 participants list. You can go -- either hover over 19 your name or select the raise your hand button at 2.0 the bottom right. 21 Likewise, if you're calling on telephone, 22 you can dial star 9 and that will show me that you 23 would like to make a comment. And if all else 24 fails, you can wave your hands in front of your

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camera and I will do a scan before we close public

comment. And then again, to the chat function, you 1 2 can submit your public comment to me via chat on 3 I just ask that you give your name and 4 address prior -- along with your message. And, 5 again, also, prior to giving your comment, after we 6 call on you, please give your full name and address 7 for the record. 8 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 9 because I had commented earlier -- this is Bill 10 Cargo -- because I commented earlier that I 11 received an email directly on my work email, I 12 wanted to bring that up at this time. 13 First of all, the question was whether 14 Heartwood Lodge is part of the proposed drainage 15 district. It looks like the facility itself is 16 outside the drainage district, but a small portion 17 of their vacant property is within the district. 18 And so I wanted to get that on the record to answer 19 that question. 2.0 The other thing is I have a 21 representative of Heartwood Lodge, Mark Reenders, 22 M-A-R-K, Reenders, R-E-E-N-D-E-R-S, and he has sent 23 an email to me at my work address to simply say

that Heartwood Lodge has no water issues or

stormwater issues, and we are against this if it's

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going to cost Heartwood Lodge any money. His 1 2 concern, of course, is with the -- his assessment. 3 But he did acknowledge that Heartwood Lodge -- the 4 facility is outside of the district, but they do 5 have some vacant property within the district. 6 So I appreciate that forbearance, Steve, 7 and I'll turn it back to you. 8 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Thank you, 9 Mr. Chair. 10 It should also be noted that the Water 11 Resources Office did receive some correspondence as 12 well which was provided to the board members and that will be part of the official record. 13 14 It looks like the first comment that we 15 have is from Raymond. That's what the user name 16 is. So, Raymond, if you could introduce yourself 17 and give your address for the record, that would be 18 great. 19 TAMMY RAYMOND: My name is Tammy Raymond, 2.0 and I live at 17569 Park Place Circle, and I am 21 here on behalf of the Park Place Condo Association. 22 I would like to thank the members of the 23 BOD for this opportunity to convey the importance 24 of Ottawa County taking over the Park Place

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Drainage District.

The past and present water drainage system design has created chronic flooding issues within Park Place for over 20 years, but it has reached a new level of flooding in 2020.

2.0

Over the years Park Place and the City of Ferrysburg have gone round and round with different engineering firms with proposed drainage solutions and even some implementation of those proposals. But as you noticed in the documentation that was given to you, clearly we are here today because it is still very problematic and an inadequate system.

Considering the high lake levels, high groundwater levels, inadequate drainage systems in the surrounding neighborhoods, and the design of Coast Guard Park with no effective drainage system it is very likely that if nothing changes we will once again experience flooding in many units.

For example, this past spring, April 29, we had a major rain event of 7 inches in 24 hours, and 12 of our 44 units had water breach their units because of an inadequate drainage system.

But then on the weekend of May 16-17 we received another 5 inches with additional water gushing into our small retention pond from the surrounding roads and housing developments on

Parkwood due to the easement the city put in place in 2000. Combined with the flooding of Coast Guard Park, whose design allows water to flow into our large retention pond and back property, we were surrounded with water with no place for it to go. So, as a result, 21 of our 44 units were flooded in this event.

2.0

The residents of Park Place have had to live in a total state of chaos and upheaval in their condos due to this major flooding. They have spent combined amounts of over \$300,000 on significant repairs, replacement of flooring, furnishings and material and even indoor and outdoor structural remedies from all the damage that was done.

Considering that most of our residents are in their retirement years with limited income, the financial, physical, and mental toll has been immense, and much of that toll remains today. It is also disconcerting that many of our property values are now in jeopardy.

And while this flooding was the straw that broke the camel's back for Park Place, many condo units were suffering water issues well before 2020. Therefore, we need immediate action to

address the inadequate drainage system all over the 1 2 neighborhoods surrounding Coast Guard Park and 3 within the park. 4 As an association, we are encouraged by 5 the hope of Joe Bush and the Ottawa County 6 management team taking over Park Place drainage 7 system and tackling this project with long-term We believe that they will get to the 8 solutions. 9 root of the issues surrounding this project and 10 provide the solutions we desperately need. 11 you. 12 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you, 13 Tammy. You did that in three minutes and 10 14 seconds. That's a lot of information you shared in 15 a short period of time. I appreciate that. 16 TAMMY RAYMOND: If anyone in -- there's 17 other people that might want to comment, so if 18 Raymond raises their hand again, it will be one of 19 the neighbors. 2.0 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. 21 Appreciate that. 22 Steve, who is next? 23 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: The next comment, 24 the user name Bruhns, B-R-U-H-N-S. If you could

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unmute yourself and give your name and address for

the record, please. 1 2 CALVIN BRUHN: Hello. My name is Calvin 3 I'm representing the properties at 18100, 18102, 18110, 18112, 18120, and 18122 Alpine Court. 4 5 I appreciate that we have finally started 6 to find the solution to this long-term problem. 7 This is not just a 2020 issue, this is -- we first flooded in 2009, we flooded again in 2013, and then 8 9 again this -- in April, at the end of April, with 10 the large rainstorm, we had the flooding again. 11 The only time we flood is when there is 12 standing water in Coast Guard Park. The water 13 drains to the stormwater system, but it pools there 14 and it has nowhere to go. 15 Between the three buildings and two units 16 per building that I'm representing today we have 17 spent over \$160,000 this year alone to repair damages and clean up and other things like that. 18 19 Plus, we still have more costs coming in to repair 2.0 drywall, replacing drywall, and putting new 2.1 flooring down. 22 I know residents across Alpine have also 23 flooded, and I know the residents across the street 24 at Mohawk have also flooded.

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So, again, I just appreciate that the

county is looking into this, and we hope that there 1 2 is a solution coming that will help us keep from 3 flooding again. Thank you. 4 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Okay. Thank you 5 for your comment. 6 The next comment is from Michael Koert, 7 K-O-E-R-T. If you could unmute yourself, introduce yourself and your address for the record, please. 8 9 MICHAEL KOERT: Hi. I'm Michael Koert. 10 I live at 17745 North Shore Drive. 11 I am currently the (inaudible) maintainer 12 of the man-made natural creek on the far east side 13 of the map provided by the Park Place Circle. And 14 during every year and every heavy rain a lot of 15 water comes from Dunewood Court, Cherokee Drive, 16 and other parts of those properties that runs off 17 into the woods north of me and then goes into the 18 small creek that I try to maintain. At this point 19 it is only a few inches. 2.0 And I would like to propose that the map 2.1 be expanded at least to that drain to better 22 facilitate the drainage from this Parkwood Circle 23 due to the fact that it is mainly water collection 24 north of me that is sitting there preventing

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drainage for all these places to dry out. And if

there is a way to make it dry out and be dryer 1 2 throughout the year, it would benefit I think all 3 of us and even all the neighbors to the east of me. 4 I've spoken to many of them. They've all spent 5 10-, 20-, some are up to \$30,000 in water 6 prevention systems which just in the end goes back 7 into their house because there is no proper drainage from the north side to the south side of 8 9 North Shore Drive. 10 So I'm just proposing that the map is 11 expanded to better maintain that creek through some 12 sort of partnership with me and the city or the 13 county to allow that drain to be maintained and 14 better help all the residents. 15 So that's all. Thank you. 16 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you. 17 Thank you for your comments. ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: It looks like we 18 19 have another commenter under Raymond. So if you 2.0 could just unmute yourself on there and introduce 2.1 yourself for the record, please. 22 STEVE SUPKA: We are Pam and Steve Supka. 23 We live at 17572 Park Place Circle. We live on 2.4 the small pond Park Place Circle and moved here

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four years ago.

I'm going to start with a documentation from consulting engineers on their analysis of the drain situation to both ponds dated 2007.

2.0

The Park Place Circle retention ponds
receive stormwater runoff from approximately 19
acres of land. This area is broken down as
follows: Parkwood Drive right-of-way, two acres.
Land north of Parkwood Drive, eight acres.
Parkwood Place Circle condos, nine acres. Total
area is nineteen acres.

Originally the connecting pipe of the two ponds was 12 inches in diameter, and on this 2007 document the engineer suggested enlarging the 12-inch pipe to 36 inches in diameter to relieve the flooding situation. This (inaudible) of the association with flooding still occurring after enlarging the pipe.

Fast-forward to 4/29/20 and 5/17/20 when we had unprecedented rainfall causing Coast Guard Park to flood to the point of flood water backing up into the big pond. Which in turn backed up into the small pond. And those 19 acres of water came into the small pond. We kept 14 inches of water from coming into our walkout basement. And I worked out neighbor's walkout basement with a wall

of sandbags on the edge of the concrete patio. 1 2 Then staying up two days and two nights 3 continuously pumping water out of the patios to the 4 other side of the sandbagged wall until the rain 5 stopped. 6 Unfortunately, due to high water table, 7 water came up through the basement floors both condos and all areas of the basement creating 8 9 removal of carpet, padding, drywall, thereby 10 approximately 15- to \$20,000 damage with no 11 insurance coverage for both condos. 12 We believe the drainage situation in this 13 whole area needs to be updated to accommodate the 14 fact we here on Park Place Circle and surrounding 15 areas live at the bottom of a funnel. And until 16 this drainage system is made to fix the whole area, we never will be free of flooding. 17 Thank you. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 18 Thank you. 19 I appreciate that. 2.0 Steve? 2.1 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Okay. 22 anybody else there -- while we are on you guys, 23 does anybody else there want to give comment? 2.4 TAMMY RAYMOND: Nope. We just want it 25 fixed.

1 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Okay. Great.

2.0

2.1

We have one more comment here from the phone number ending in 4672. You are unmuted. So if you could go ahead and introduce yourself for the record, your name and address.

JOE MASVERO: Yes. Joe Masvero. Address is 17557 Park Place.

Thank you, Tammy and Steve, neighbors.

I was also up that evening -- I live on the opposite side of the street near the -- if you look at the district drainage map that we were mailed, the larger pond that has a cement cutout which was part of the change in how this whole area, or much of it, drains. The solution was very limited in the fact that the city and the engineers just believed that you could just dump water into Coast Guard Park and it would absorb it.

Given our current climate, high water table, all of that, higher water temperatures, possible global warming, this problem will not go away unless there is a drain not just for Park Place but really Coast Guard Park. I would say that Coast Guard Park, only way that it drains water out is to Park Place's pond because of that first place view. It took the city, when they

finally began pumping, weeks to drain out the park. 1 2 And the park is a considerable asset that 3 is used not just by this drainage district but 4 people that live way outside of it. And it's not 5 acceptable to have a city asset -- Coast Guard Park 6 is beautiful, that's why we all live here -- to 7 just allow it to have standing water like that. 8 And though I do appreciate the gesture of 9 receiving some American Red Cross cleanup kits and 10 a safety warning letter from the county of the 11 dangers of flood water and standing water, that is 12 really unacceptable for this entire area to have 13 such a great asset known as Coast Guard Park to 14 become a temporary holding pond and be unusable. 15 And thankfully, we had almost the weakest 16 winter last year. So the reason why this is urgent 17 is because if we had maybe a more typical winter 18 along with our spring rain, this is going to be an 19 ongoing problem. 2.0 And so I do encourage the members of the 2.1 Board of Determination to deem this as totally 22 necessary. Thank you. 23 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Okay. Thank you. 2.4 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Steve, do

you have any other public comments?

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ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: We have one in the 1 2 It is from Mike Beahan, B-E-A-H-A-N, and his 3 address is 17464 Dunewood. And he says that it 4 appears the flooding is a result of an inadequate 5 master plan. What recourse is there to hold 6 physically accountable those who approve building 7 permits and on the builders of the properties now experiencing flood issues. 8 9 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Well, one 10 of the things I think that should be made clear to 11 the public is that if this is made into a public 12 drain, the different municipalities, the county, the road commission if necessary, they would all 13 14 pay a portion of any plan, and that portion and the 15 assessment can be negotiated between Joe Bush and 16 Ferrysburg, Joe Bush and Spring Lake Township. And so they will be taking a look at that. There is 17 18 a -- if something is wrong here, they are going to 19 have to pay a portion of the cost at large. 2.0 Is that an accurate statement, Joe? 2.1 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Yep, 22 you're correct, Bill. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 23 24 And, again, we're not looking at the assessment

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portion at this public hearing, we're only looking

at whether there are problems that are sufficient 1 2 to say that a project is necessary within this 3 newly created drainage district. 4 Steve, do you have any other questions, 5 or should we make any reference other than the 6 brief reference you made to the emails that have 7 been shared with the Board of Determination 8 members? 9 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Actually, I have 10 one more comment I see. It's from Todd Kolasa, 11 K-O-L-A-S-A. If you could unmute yourself and 12 identify yourself for the record. 13 TODD KOLASA: Hi. My name is Todd 14 Kolasa. I live at 17595 Park Place Circle. And 15 I'm speaking for myself as well as a couple of my 16 neighbors that are in units adjacent to mine and 17 next to mine. 18 We've all been dealing with 19 groundwater -- we just purchased last April 2019, 2.0 and we've been dealing with groundwater pretty much 21 since then and pumping out continually. 22 Of course, the previous callers spoke 23 about the storms of this year and the devastating 24 effect they've had. We experienced that as well.

25

Myself and neighbors I've seen have had to replace

drywall, flooring, clean out, etc. 1 2 Our unit in particular, we completely 3 remodeled the basement prior to the flooding, and 4 so we've, effectively, remodeled it twice. We got 5 close to \$30,000 invested in this that I can account for directly, not to mention countless 6 7 hours pumping as well as dealing with utility bills that are probably at least twice to three times 8 9 what they should be if we weren't dealing with all 10 the extra electricity being used. 11 And I believe the comments made regarding 12 the Coast Guard Park being an asset that we all 13 enjoy, those and everyone around us would really 14 appreciate that getting back to the glory that it 15 had when we first saw it when it was a dry period. 16 That's it. I appreciate this chance to 17 speak. And thanks for the help. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 18 Thank you. 19 Steve, do we have anybody else who has 2.0 raised their hand electronically that would like to 21 speak? 22 ATTORNEY STEVE KOSKI: Actually, we just 23 did. The user name Hopp 85, if you could unmute 24 yourself and identify yourself for the record,

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I'm going to echo many of the comments that were made for this Board of Determination, we have a very narrow decision to make, and the narrow decision is are there sufficient problems to create, because of necessity, a drainage district.

We don't look at what the assessments are going to be, if any. We don't look at what the project is going to be. We just look at whether there are sufficient problems to create the necessity of the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner going in there and trying to find a solution.

What I would note from public comments is that there have been stormwater management problems as far back as 2007, and based on some of the emails I've read previously, maybe even prior to that. This has, then, of course, become exacerbated by the high groundwater levels and lake levels, and because of that, based on the comments I've received just on the people who spoke, they

had over \$460,000 worth of damage that has occurred 1 2 just this year. This makes my decision very easy 3 is that there is a necessity for a public project 4 or a public drain that can have a project to 5 correct the stormwater issues. And so I will make a motion that the 6 7 location, establishment, and construction of the Park Place Circle Drain is necessary and conducive 8 9 to the public health, convenience, or welfare. 10 Is there support? 11 BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDERKLOK: 12 support that, Mr. Chairman. 13 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I have 14 support from Rich for my motion. 15 Is there any other comments from the 16 Board of Determination members before we call a roll call vote on this? 17 18 BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I'm saying 19 I might have missed it, but did you read any 2.0 communication by letter? 2.1 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: We had 22 emails from the -- let me bring these up.
