4	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Good morning,
5	everyone. All right. Welcome to Barber School for the Board
6	of Determination.
7	Can everybody hear me in the back, for the Yonker
8	Drain?
9	A lot of you are probably wondering well I got this
10	letter and what is this about. This is all per state law per
11	Drain Code. So that's why we're having this public hearing
12	and it's a Board of Determination.
13	Again, I'm Joe Bush, the Ottawa County Water
14	Resources Commissioner, or Drain Commissioner. I'm your
15	elected official and I'm the one that actually goes by this
16	Drain Code and the state law.
17	What that says is I have to hold a Board of
18	Determination, a public hearing. This is and during that
19	process, I either have to get a petition from either the
20	township or the people.
21	This one here I was petitioned by the township on
22	the Yonker Drain, possibly to add a piece of Yonker Drain,
23	the extension from where it ends to the bayou, because there
24	is some issues in there.

There has been several property owners, by Arthur

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Court, some of you might be it from there; some of you others might have water issues and flooding concerns. And it's been going on for awhile now. This just didn't happen. It's something that's been going on for awhile.

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And finally the township said, hey, the piece that is in issue is an orphan drain. I don't have easements, I don't have no legal jurisdiction to be in there, only on the Yonker Drain. So if you live on the Yonker Drain you know we've done maintenance on that.

I have about a thousand county drains that I do maintenance on, that means I have easements, I have legal jurisdiction to be in there and do that maintenance.

This particular area where all these concerns are, I don't have any jurisdiction. In order to do that, I got to hold a public hearing.

So today you guys are here and hopefully we hear from a lot of you, that's good, it's a great turnout so I appreciate you taking your time on a morning, at 10 o'clock to come and voice your opinion whether you're in favor of or don't have a problem. That's okay.

And then some people are here probably having a problem, please voice your opinion today because everything is court recorded. Now by law I don't have to have a court recorder, but I do that to protect you and me and the township and the county and everybody else that it's court

recorded, word for word. So whatever your disagreements are, whatever your issues are -- sometimes we don't know the issues until we hold one of these. And it's like, oh, I got an issue; oh, I got an issue. So that's good. I'm glad we have a lot of people turn out for these.

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Some people say why don't you have these at night?

I get more people in the daytime than I do at night. I get a
lot of people at night complaining their kids have sports,
supper time, homework, it's inconvenient. So I try to hold
them in the afternoon because it seems to work okay. I know
it doesn't fit everybody's schedule but -- I hold a lot of
these. So this isn't like these are rare. These are
happening with the water tables, the water issues, I'm
getting a lot more petitions.

But that's where it came from. It came from the township. They felt a need, as a board to petition me to hold a public hearing like we're having today.

So that's -- I heard a lot of calls, a lot of questions, who started this?

Well it's not really starting, it's just a process. It's not a way to do something that isn't -- everybody got a notice who is in the proposed drain district. Some of you might not agree with the drain district, might not understand it.

We have the engineering firm here to go through

that process. If there is some concern that I'm not in this drain district, we're here to help. We're not here to say yes, you are. We want to understand why you feel you don't or are you. So the engineering firm will go through that today in their presentation.

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These three gentlemen I pick, they're like well who is the board? None of these are Spring Lake Township residents, nor do they own land in the district. I have to pick a three-panel board who live within the county, but also understand drain law, Drain Code, understand assessments, understand township business. Most importantly understand drainage.

This three panel I picked, these three men have done numerous boards for the last eight years. I'm going on my third term in 2020, I'm up for re-election. And during my three terms these three people have been every year, a lot of BODs. They understand it. They want to listen to you. They don't know anything about this, what's going on. I don't give them a heads up like, this is going on. I don't communicate with these individuals.

They're here for the first time going -- to hear your opinions and the engineer's, and the township, and the road commission, or whoever else has issues.

And if anybody wonders where this is, if you go north on 148th and they're replacing the culvert, the road

commission, that's the same watercourse we're talking about, it's just a little further downstream where we're having some flooding issues and some concerns.

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So people are like, well where is this? It's in that location, just north of M-104.

And then so these three-panel board members, once I give them the oath, they run the meeting. It's not my decision, it's not my meeting, it's those three gentlemen there. They're here today to hear what you guys have to say.

This is a necessity, this isn't what is the cost of the project. We don't have a project technically because we haven't had this hearing yet. This is part of the process.

I can't just go and do something without having this today.

They say it's a necessity or not. They'll make motions later. They can either say, you know, we don't see this being under Joe's jurisdiction, we're not going to say it's okay; or they could come back and say, we can see this being under Joe's jurisdiction, under the Water Resources Commissioner and we're in favor of moving forward for something for a fix. That's totally up to these three gentlemen, I have no say in that.

And that's why we have a public hearing and that's why it's important for you to voice your concerns or opinions or your issues.

We have Margie, and Margie, she is writing

everything down, or typing it I should say. And you can either get that on my website -- it takes be about four to six weeks. I post the minutes from every Board of Determination that I have. Very transparent.

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If you don't have the internet or a computer or something, always call us, and we'll try to get a hard copy to you. It takes her about four to six weeks from what she's doing there to get it back to me, but everything is word for word. So everything from what they say and talk about from the public out here.

And then -- so I'll go ahead and do some introductions. And again, once I give the oath, voice all your concerns, questions, come to the podium, speak loudly so she can get your name, address and she understands what you're talking about. Because sometimes she -- it's very fast. So she wants to hear you loud and clear.

From right to left, we have Rich. Rich is from Georgetown Township, a board member over there. Like I said, been doing a lot of these for me.

In the center is Bill Cargo, some of you might know him. He's from Grand Haven Township, he's the manager and another fellow whose been doing these for a long time. He understands Drain Code and understands township business.

And then Ken. Ken lives in Port Sheldon Township.

He worked for the road commission for, I always get it wrong,

but nearly forty years, right?
BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Yes.
WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: So he was an
engineer over there, retired. He doesn't work for the road
commissioner anymore, but he has a lot of experience with
drainage and Drain Code and understands why we're here today.
So that's important to have those three gentlemen that
understand.
And then we have Jerry Olman in the front row from
the Ottawa County Road Commission.
And then we have Lucas is from Prein & Newhof the
engineering firm. We have Gordon Gallagher, your township
manager from Spring Lake. And in the back who helped people
sign in, we have my secretary Sara and my chief deputy, Chad.
And I don't think I'm missing anybody. I think
that's it.
Again, I really appreciate your time to come here
today and voice your opinions and speak if you need to.
Nobody has to speak, but please share. Because
these three gentlemen go off what you guys say, not what
really I say. Because I just do the legal part of it and
hold the public hearing, and then move forward if they decide
to. That's why I'm here.
So thank you, again.

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Gentlemen, please rise and raise your right hand.

1	Do you each solemnly swear that you will faithfully
2	perform and discharge the duties imposed upon you as required
3	by law as members of the Board of Determination appointed by
4	the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner to determine
5	the necessity for maintenance and improvement of the Yonker
6	Drain located in Spring Lake Township, in said county,
7	gentlemen?
8	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I do.
9	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: I do.
10	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDER KLOK: I do.
11	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thank you.
12	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: First it is my mic,
13	can you hear me in the audience fine? If anybody can't hear
14	me, I'm not familiar with this sound system so I want to make
15	sure it's working.
16	The first thing we're going to do is select a
17	secretary and a chairperson.
18	Do we have any motions?
19	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDER KLOK: I'll make the
20	motion that Bill Cargo serve as chair.
21	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll second that motion.
22	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: We have a motion and a
23	second; all in favor of electing Cargo as chair, say aye.
24	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
25	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Aye.

1	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDER KLOK: Aye.
2	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Opposed?
3	And then we also need that is passed.
4	We also need to make a motion to elect a secretary.
5	Do we have a motion on that?
6	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I make a motion that Rich
7	is secretary.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And I'll support that
9	motion.
10	Any discussion? In other words it's your only
11	chance to back away, Rich.
12	There isn't any, so all in favor of Rich being the
13	secretary, say aye.
14	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
15	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDER KLOK: Aye.
16	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Aye.
17	Opposed? The same.
18	So, Rich, you are the secretary for this meeting.
19	The other thing we do is we typically adopt a
20	motion to limit public comments per person to three minutes
21	an individual. We have a room full of people. You can
22	summarize War And Peace typically in about three minutes. So
23	hopefully that will be sufficient time.
24	So is there a motion to limit public comments to
25	three minutes?

1	BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: I'm make that
2	motion, Mr. Chairman.
3	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll second it.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: We have a motion and
5	support. All in favor of limiting public comments to three
б	minutes, say aye.
7	BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Aye.
8	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Aye.
9	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
10	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And then we're going to
11	begin to go through public comment period, but we start by
12	just taking some information from the engineer.
13	And the engineer today is with Prein & Newhof. And
14	again they will speak and do you have a sound system so you
15	can be heard?
16	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: I will project my voice.
17	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Good.
18	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Thank you, Bill.
19	My name is Lucas Timmer. I'm an engineer with
20	Prein & Newhof, and as Joe had mentioned, we were hired to
21	put together the necessary documents for this Board of
22	Determination for the Yonker Drain.
23	So the Yonker Drain is an existing county drain
24	located in Crockery Township. The drain discharges into a
25	watercourse located east of 144th Avenue and south of State

Road.

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This watercourse is considered an orphan system.

And this watercourse ends up discharging into Lloyd's Bayou just south of M-104 in Spring Lake Township.

As Joe had mentioned earlier, this watercourse is considered an orphan system. So it lacks authorized local and county governmental jurisdiction, and there is also then no funding mechanisms in place to address any current or future needs for maintenance and improvements.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Lucas, can I ask a favor? I cannot see this, I did before. I think somebody tipped it. Can you move it a little bit?

That is perfect, now we can see it. Thank you.

ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: So the Yonker Drain was petitioned by Spring Lake Township on September 9, 2019 under Chapter 8 of the Michigan Drain Code and Chapter 8 relates to the extension of an existing county drain.

And as Joe had mentioned too, a Michigan Drain Code requires a Board of Determination meeting, so that's why we're all here today.

So this is a map of the Yonker Drain drainage district. A drainage district essentially is a watershed. So if you are inside that watershed, you then contribute runoff to the Yonker Drain.

It's tough to see on this picture right here, but

the highlighted yellow portion of that watercourse was the historic Yonker Drain. And as I had said earlier, that is in Crockery Township, and is east of 144th and south of State Road.

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And then that blue section that goes from 144th all the way to M-104 is the -- it's currently an orphan system and that's what's being proposed to be extended as a county drain.

So this is an aerial showing the Yonker Drain drainage district. These drainage districts are delineated by using contour data. So we're able to look at where high spots are and low spots to determine how the runoff then can get to the Yonker Drain.

We also look at record drawings of utilities just to get more information on the road, on where high spots and low spots are in the road. And we also do a field verification where we can check roads.

We obviously can't go on all your private property to see where hills are, but the contour data is very accurate. We have one-foot contour data in Ottawa County and that's about as accurate as you can get in the whole state.

So this is where the 36-inch culvert is located.

It's located on the North Bank Trail. It's a popular regional trail that was built on an old railroad berm. And this nonmotorized trail connects from Spring Lake and will

eventually get all the way to Nunica.

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And there is also a sanitary sewer that's located in this North Bank, underneath the North Bank Trail. It's a 10-inch sanitary sewer that Spring Lake Township has. And this is the primary problem area.

So I'll give you guys a little bit of a timeline. In the summer of 2019 a sink hole in the bike trail formed. I'm guessing a few guys may have noticed that if you ride your bike at all on that trail.

The suspected reason for that sink hole is that there is a 36-inch culvert that is underneath that bike trail. The bike trail is built up 22 feet high from the railroad berm. And this culvert, it's tough to tell how old it is, but it could even be potentially have put in when the railroad was put in. So it's a very old culvert.

What we've noticed too, when that sink hole had formed was that the 10-inch sanitary sewer was having some issues with settling. And we were able to notice that by running a camera through that sanitary sewer. And we noticed that because of that sink hole, the sewer was settling and that was a major concern that that sewer could end up failing.

What was also noticed and brought to the attention, to Ottawa County and Spring Lake was water levels upstream of the culvert increased, which concerns a lot of the residents,

as Joe had brought up, Arthur Court and a couple of the other locations between 148th and the North Bank Trail.

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So in the fall of 2019 Spring Lake Township did a temporary repair to stabilize that sanitary sewer that had settled just so that that could be stabilized as that sink hole continues to grow.

Also there was some work done to dig out the upstream and downstream ends of that culvert so that water could continue to flow through that culvert.

And we believe the sink hole is caused by an issue with that culvert failing, and that culvert then gets blocked, and that's what is causing that water to back up upstream.

And digging out in front of those culverts has been able to help; but we've noticed even after a couple days it often seems like it gets blocked up again with debris and sediment.

So here is a picture of the sink hole in the path.

It's been filled multiple times but continues to exhibit signs of settling.

So here is a photo that shows the North Bank Trail and it's probably a little tough to read but you can see there are two primary residents or -- that we've received phone calls from. The first one is from 15324 State Road. This property owner has noticed some very high water levels

in his backyard.

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And we've also received some calls from the residents at Arthur Court Condos. And there are two condos located on the east side of Arthur Court, just south of State Road, and they're noticing the high water levels approaching their walkout basements. And that is a major concern to those residents there.

So we'll quick go through these pictures. But this shows -- you're looking north on the North Bank Trail. Here you just see what looks like almost a lake. Typically you would actually see about an eight-foot or nine-foot wide stream, and those would be all wetland areas. But with the high water levels here, you can't even see a stream anymore because the water is above the banks, and now it looks like a giant lake.

Here is another photo too of the water levels backed up in this area.

So here is some photos from the resident at 15324

State Road. These were both provided from that resident.

One of the photos is from summer 2019, I believe in June when the water levels were a little lower. You can see on the photo on the left that there is no water there in his backyard.

The next photo shows from September 16, high water levels and this property owner has a lot of concerns that

with this backed-up culvert that this water level will keep approaching their residence.

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Here is a photo by Arthur Court Condos. This is just south of those two condos I had mentioned that are noticing high water levels near their walkout basement. This typically would be a nice dry lawn that someone could mow. Now it's filled with water and that whole wetland area has essentially become a giant lake and starting to flood a lot of these areas.

So our next steps is we will have time for public testimony where you guys can provide any input that you have and if there is anything that I did not mention, because I wasn't aware of it, you can then provide that to us.

The Board will then determine the necessity of the petition based on public health, welfare and/or convenience.

If a petition is deemed necessary, the Yonker Drain then will be extended from its terminus where it is currently in Crockery Township and it will extend all the way to M-104 and include that natural water course.

We would then move ahead with project design to address that failing culvert. There would have to then be easement acquisition because that's been a natural watercourse forever and currently doesn't have any easements on it for Joe Bush's office to do any work on it.

The project would then be bid and that culvert then

could be removed and replaced. 2 And then following that would be a day of review of 3 apportionment.

And if a petition is not deemed necessary, then no further action by the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner office will occur.

So thank you for your time.

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BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Lucas, a couple follow-up questions.

When you talk about an orphan drain, for my clarification, that means nobody has jurisdiction or responsibility for that portion of the drain that's called an orphan?

> ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That is correct.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: So is it technically that, what I understand, you cannot spend money on what is technically a private problem?

> ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That is correct.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And so if the drain commission wanted to do work on this, he would typically, if it was a public drain, be able to assess part of the costs to the county, part of the costs to the road commission, part of the costs to the township; but right now he doesn't have that ability because it's not under his jurisdiction. It's an orphan drain.

1	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That is correct, Bill.
2	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay, thank you.
3	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Thank you.
4	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: We're now going to
5	begin the public comment portion. But before we do that, we
6	always give the local governments a chance to make a comment.
7	We have Ken from the road commission.
8	Ken, do you have any comments that you would like
9	to make Jerry. I'm sorry, Ken is next to me.
10	Jerry, do you have any comments?
11	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: I don't right now.
12	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay, thank you.
13	We also have the township manager Gordon Gallagher
14	here.
15	Gordon, do you have any comments? This was
16	petitioned by the township board.
17	SPRING LAKE TOWNSHIP MANAGER GORDON GALLAGHER:
18	Just very briefly that we've had this concern for awhile that
19	this culvert has been in place for, we think, more than 80
20	years and the concern is that if that culvert continues to
21	have problems, that water won't be able to pass through.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And you're willing to
23	spend some of your public monies on this if it was a public
24	drain?
25	SPRING LAKE TOWNSHIP MANAGER GORDON GALLAGHER: And

I think the engineer explained the problem pretty well. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. And you think 80 3 years is too old for a culvert? 4 SPRING LAKE TOWNSHIP MANAGER GORDON GALLAGHER: 5 Surprise, surprise. 6 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. Now we're going 7 to take public comments, but first I see we have some 8 correspondence. 9 Rich, if you could go over the correspondence that 10 we have received, I'd appreciate it. 11 BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Sure. There are two pieces of correspondence. The first, this is from 12 13 Steve -- well let me back up just a bit. 14 He apparently spoke with the Ottawa County Water 15 Resources office and his name is Steve Namenye, I'm not sure 16 I'm pronouncing that correct, it's N-A-M-E-N-Y-E. And he 17 spoke to them on October 15, 2019 around the concerns of whether his property falls within the said Yonker Drain 18 19 district. He is on the furthest south portion of the drain 2.0 district on 152nd Avenue.

He wanted to make sure that if the addition to the Yonker Drain is found to be a necessity, that his property be looked at again on whether it is actually in the Yonker Drain district. The slope of his backyard falls to the west and to the south, which would mean that it does not make its way to

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the Yonker Drain.

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And then the second piece of correspondence comes from Susan Wierenga. And she says, because I do not have -- because I cannot attend the meeting at 10 a.m. on October 22, 2019, I would like to express my opinion on the expansion of the Yonker Drain.

My feeling is that this should not be extended or expanded. If there are others that need better drainage, let them find a way for them, but not at my expense as a property owner in Crockery Township. This in no way benefits anyone in Crockery.

And that's the end of the correspondence.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay

We're now going to open it up for additional public comments. And again I remind people when you come up to the podium for the purposes of the record, if you would state your name and address, if you can identify where you live in the district, that would be helpful. It's not required. And then any comments you have regarding any problems you're aware of or any questions you have on the process, that would be fine too.

And typically what I do is I will start in the front row right here on my left, your right.

Is there anybody in the front row that would like to speak? Just come up to the podium then.

MS. JOANNE BROWNLEE: My name is Joanne Brownlee, B-R-O-W-N-L-E-E. I live at 17290 Woodland Lane in Nunica, that's Crockery Township.

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And to go on from what you said, Bill, could we have an explanation as to how a drain becomes orphaned over time?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It didn't become orphaned over time. It was never accepted into the county drain system.

And so one of the things that I know a number of communities are doing is they're identifying these drains which are essentially technically private drains, because they're not under the responsibility of the Ottawa County Water Resources Commission. And so it was never brought into the drainage district.

Now sometimes people thought it was, but then you go back and you look at the paperwork and we found out it was done incorrectly. So this could have been a mistake from 80 years ago. It could have been something that was just never bought in because at the time they didn't think it was necessary.

MS. JOANNE BROWNLEE: Okay, thank you.

And just a curiosity, not having any problems. I am a neighbor to Sue Wierenga that sent in the correspondence, and I share her feelings. Thank you.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Thank you. 1 2 The gentleman next to her, any comments? 3 Then I'll go to the second row on my right, on the 4 far side. Any questions from the people in the second row, 5 would you like to make any comments? 6 The gentleman with the baseball cap, just come up. 7 And again just give your name and address. 8 MR. RAY SUCHECKI: My name is Ray Suchecki. I live 9 at 17458 - 144th Avenue. 10 And my question is through the years, the Yonker 11 Drain has been in effect and I own property where the Yonker 12 Drain goes across 144th. Now a few years back they came in 13 there, the drain commission and cleaned the Yonker Drain. 14 And they stopped, say, 200 feet from 144th. 15 So the Yonker Drain goes down State Road, across 16 some property and crosses mine. And it ends on my property. Now from the road back up to the Yonker Drain, that 17 I consider my creek. And from where the Yonker Drain comes 18 19 in to my property, years ago I wanted to put up trout ponds 2.0 And I couldn't do it because they said it was wetlands. 21 I had a couple cattails growing in there. 22 So they've checked it out and from where the drain 23 comes into my property and crosses my backyard, and to where 24 the culvert is going underneath 144th, they said there was a

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15-foot drop in the elevation.

And in the spring time, we do have water coming down off State Road going into the creek. And after it dries up a little bit, there is no water coming down that drain. The only thing we have there is I can go to the side of the creek, scrape the leaves away a little bit from down in the bottom of the creek bed, and water comes pouring out. It's all spring fed back there behind my house.

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BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.

MR. RAY SUCHECKI: And I was just wondering and trying to find out why the Yonker Drain ends where it ends right now.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And that's the question that is hard to determine because that drain district was made -- when was the original Yonker Drain drain district created?

ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: I looked through some documents, and some of the earliest stuff I could find was 1955 and it was already a drain then, so it's before even 1955.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Before 1955, so I cannot go back and try to figure out why they stopped it where they do. It doesn't make a lot of sense to me if it's supposed to follow the natural watercourse, but that's -it's hard to go back.

And some of these drains were created in the 1800s

and we just don't know. So the records are not that -- were 1 2 not as clear. 3 Now with our electronic recordkeeping everything we 4 say is kept somewhere, but I can't go back that far. 5 MR. RAY SUCHECKI: Well right now we have a steady 6 flow of spring water coming out of the side of the hills 7 there. BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Um-hum. 8 9 MR. RAY SUCHECKI: And it's probably only five, six 10 inches deep. So we have had no definite problem with water. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: On your property you 12 have no problems there at all, okay. Appreciate it. 13 MR. RAY SUCHECKI: Thank you. 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Thank you. 15 And the gentleman next to him. 16 MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: My name is Richard Suchecki. 17 I live at 17438 - 144th, my dad's neighbor. 18 And when we say orphan drain can we just say this 19 is a natural creek that runs -- it's called Yonker Drain, but 2.0 it's -- it goes past, east of us, fills into the bayou and 2.1 it's got a couple creek names, I believe, Norris is one of 22 them. 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Um-hum. 2.4 MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: So it's a creek. 25 So this creek has -- is flowing. It's flowing

today. It's always been flowing. So the drainage to me, in 1 2 my view, is it's working just -- it works proper. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And that may be 4 absolutely correct right now for that creek. And that's why 5 we're asking for the public comments. 6 MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: Correct. 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And they're not saying that they're going to come in there and dig out a creek or 8 9 anything like that. 10 MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: So the issues seem to be at 12 13 the culvert at the road, or at the railroad bed. So -- and 14 it is my understanding -- I did not know that there was a 15 sanitary line. Is that just at 148th? Or does that sanitary 16 line also go down the old railroad? BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I think it goes down 17 the old railroad from what I understand from the comments. 18 19 Gordon, can you confirm that? 2.0 SPRING LAKE TOWNSHIP MANAGER GORDON GALLAGHER: 2.1 Yes, it does. 22 MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: So we can capture sanitary 23 tax dollars to do the repair, we can capture the culvert 24 drain from the Water Resources department, instead of 25 capturing all the tax dollars by just adding this district to

go so big, you're going to capture a lot of dollars, that's a 1 2 special assessment, just for, you know, one issue. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And they may not do 4 The assessment again is not what we're here today to that. 5 talk about. 6 For example, Grand Haven Charter Township, if it's 7 less than 15,000 we don't even bother to assess it to the 8 property owners. We just pay for it out of the general 9 funds. 10 Every community has different levels of what they 11 will contribute. 12 On large projects sometimes the communities will 13 contribute more money; but again, that's part of the 14 assessment process where the Water Resources Commissioner 15 will talk with the local municipalities to determine how much 16 money he will receive from them to help offset the cost of 17 his maintenance. But right now he's not even qualified -- excuse me, 18 authorized to do the maintenance on that culvert. And that's 19 2.0 why we're here today, from what I understand.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.

MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: Okay. So the --

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BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: So I understand your concern. But I can't answer the question of whether they're going to put any of the costs on the people within the

district.

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Now that they're looking in the district, they're seeing this drainage course is much larger than what was originally created.

MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: Okay.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: So think of it as a drainage course. It may not all be a drain -- have culverts and dug out ditches but it's all part of a drainage course.

MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: Well I understand the drainage course.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.

MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: I'm just -- I think a lot of people that have called my house, I sit on the Crockery Township board, and I'm getting phone calls about why. So everyone is concerned about the tax dollars that will be on their taxes when there is different projects going on throughout this new drain district.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And the thing is, you're absolutely correct. Your property may not benefit from the project they're talking about early on; at the same time I recall in Grand Haven Township we had a drainage district where it was a beaver had done some work, and he filled up a culvert. He was very industrious. He took one of those flat wooden pallets and plugged up a 36-inch drainage course.

Τ	And luckily that was part of the drain district
2	because by the time he got there, at the time the drain
3	commissioner got there, it was like eight feet deep, you
4	know. So at that point they were able to use public monies
5	to deal with that problem because it was a public drain.
6	That's typically what they're trying to do here.
7	They're not trying to expand the tax base from what I
8	understand, excuse me, their ability to tap into the tax
9	base.
10	MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: So there is funds available
11	through the Water Resources to help with the problem at the
12	old railroad
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: There is monies
14	available. Whether they're sufficient to pay for the costs,
15	I can't tell you.
16	What I'm hearing so far is that there is one
17	problem that's been identified that's having an impact on
18	properties within the drainage district.
19	MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: Okay.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Does that help?
21	MR. RICHARD SUCHECKI: It answers my question.
22	Thank you.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. We have, again,
24	the second row, the very first person?
25	MS. GERALYNN SUCHECKI: My name is Geralynn

Suchecki. I live at 17424 - 144th Avenue, which is right next to my brother-in-law and father-in-law.

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I just have a point blank question. Would this even be an issue if we were not experiencing hundred-year rain, flood issues? I lived in Rockford in 2013 before we moved here, and as you know, everybody had flooding, Grand Rapids, everything. You deal with it.

And I think just because in the last few years everybody is experiencing crazy water levels everywhere, that this -- had this been in a normal situation or when we're in the drought state, because it's all cyclical, I don't think all these issues would be right up primary if the water levels, due to the rain and the weather, that we have no control over, this is making this a big issue for people.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It's making it worse, I agree, the wet weather. Five of the last six years we've had more than normal rainfall. That means a lot of tension is puts on drains because drains are the only way we have to remove the rainfall.

But I agree, five of the last six years have been above normal rainfall.

MS. GERALYNN SUCHECKI: And I think that's what's prompting all this.

And I understand. Nobody helped us when Rogue
River went way over, went in and we had flooding, and it was

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because we had to eat it because that's life. It's an act of

RON BRONDYKE: Ron Brondyke, 14437 State Road. 3 I am just west of the State Road-144th Avenue intersection. 4 And a few years ago we had lots of water coming 5 from the northeast, down State Road, and it flooded across 6 the corner. And it came across 144th through the neighbor's 7 yard, through my yard, and down the back driveway, and it 8 goes into another county drain. 9 So my question is do I really belong in this expanded district. I believe I don't, based on what I've 10 11 actually seen, and --BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: What we'd do is with 12 your name and address, Ron, we will then check into it. 13 14 Lucas, at the end of the hearing they will verify 15 some of these people who have raised questions on whether 16 they should be included. 17 MR. RON BRONDYKE: All right, fine, thank you. BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Then I'll go to the 18 19 third row on my right? Anybody in the third row on this 2.0 section over here? The gentleman in the baseball cap? 2.1 MR. PHILIP SUCHECKI: My name is Philip Suchecki. 22 I live at 14278 State Road, Nunica. I'm on the east side of 23 Yonker Drain, close to my brothers, sisters, sister-in-law. 24 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okav. 25 MR. PHILIP SUCHECKI: You know, we understand

progress. And again for many years we've lived in that area. 1 2 They come through, they clean out on State Road, 3 they go across, clean out there. The water flow seems to be 4 It's -- it doesn't back up there. fine. 5 The problem is probably that culvert down the road you're having problems with, and again, that's progress, but, 6 7 you know, you listen to a guy say 80 years that they know that's been a problem. Now all of the sudden? 8 9 And because of the system and the rain, rain for 10 the last five years is over and above. Now it becomes a big 11 problem. 12 Now why didn't we fix it when it was a little 13 problem? 14 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: That's a good question. 15 Because we --16 MR. PHILIP SUCHECKI: We all understand that. 17 so I keep telling everybody -- I think the opinions is 18 already made out, but that's okay, you get a chance to air 19 your voice, you do that. 2.0 But the water seems to be flowing from State Road 2.1 down to 144th just fine. I don't see any properties that are 22 affected in that area. So I wish everybody would take that 23 under consideration. Thank you. 2.4 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it. 25 Next?

MR. GARRY SPARKS: I'm Garry Sparks. I live at 1 2 14270 State Road, Nunica. I'm just east of 144th on the 3 south side of State Road. We've got five acres. 4 I'm approximately 6, 700 feet off the road on State 5 and probably 4 or 500 feet off the road from the Yonker 6 Drain. 7 I really question how my runoff is even getting to that drain. I've been there 33 years, and there is never 8 9 water in that drain that runs north to south, before it gets 10 to the creek on 144th, and then that's where all the water 11 starts flowing. 12 I've already paid, for the last ten years, we've 13 paid a few hundred dollars to clean the ditch out, the 14 existing Yonker Drain. 15 I sympathize with the people that are close to the 16 bayou because the bayou is backing up. I don't understand 17 how dumping more water in the bayou is going to fix the 18 issue. It's all going to bottleneck. But yeah. 19 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it. 2.0 I'll go across the aisle now for the third row? 2.1 MR. ERIC MOE: I'm Eric Moe. I live at 15346 State 22 I'm one of the residents that is affected by the Road. 23 flooding down there. 24 The culvert is the main problem. I won't address 25 these folks' issues with not caring where their water goes

once it leaves the property, but I will discuss once it gets dumped down at the very end, it is the culvert.

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I'm uniquely qualified to understand that culvert probably more than most people here, other than my neighbor Dave. We've been trying to clean that out for the last few years.

Two years ago when we had beaver issues we did get a lot of help from the township as well as Ottawa County to try to get the beaver dams out. As soon as that gets clogged, it will go up on the north side of the bike path, which is basically an earth dam.

There is only one three-foot culvert there. That culvert is small and it has worked fine in the two-and-a-half decades that I've worked there as long as it doesn't get plugged.

Of course, now there has been a collapse on the bike path which is above the culvert which also compromised the sewer line or whatever that goes from the trailer park into town. So that's showing us or at least from my speculation and most of the engineers that the culvert is probably compromised. So that the three-foot culvert in the middle is probably a foot-and-a-half culvert now.

And so when we get any kind of sticks clogging the front end of it, then it basically fills up with water.

And literally it is the culvert because as soon as

it plugs, within days, it raises by feet on the north side of the bike path. And we're talking four feet, which means I've got probably three or four or five acres that are flooded on my property and I have hardwoods there dying.

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But that's okay, I'm not here to complain about that. I'm just stating the fact that it is the culvert. Because then when we clear out the front of the culvert which now needs to be done professionally, which the township paid for by bringing backhoes in there, it immediately drops feet. Millions of gallons get drained and it comes off our property.

And then when it clogs again, it immediately raises up. This is totally unrelated to water -- groundwater table levels, Lake Michigan levels, rains of the last five years.

I've been there for three decades. Yes, it ebbs and flows a bit down there because it is the bottom of the drainage area.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: So your testimony is really the problem with the culvert probably began about two, two-and-a-half years ago?

MR. ERIC MOE: Well, no. I'll say that's when we really needed some help because we had some beavers shoving full-sized logs in there. But I think it really happened, it started to collapse here when the bike path started to sink in April of this year.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.

MR. ERIC MOE: As soon as the bike path started to sink, water tables starting rising and we had a major problem back there again.

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And then the bike path has continued to sink. And then of course they've fixed the sewage system there, the sewer line which -- the sewer line, which is twelve feet below the bike path, but still eight feet above the culvert there.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Understand.

MR. ERIC MOE: Again, so my point of being up here is just to express, I know that culvert intimately because I've been in there chest deep clearing stuff out for the last several years when I could. I can't anymore.

When the culvert clogs, it fills up with water within days. We have millions of gallons there which come from, of course, the entire drainage district.

And again I won't go as to why they feel that they shouldn't be dealing with --

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: That's okay. We're here to determine the necessity which is --

MR. ERIC MOE: But I just want to speak for the culvert. So we assume that it's all compromised because, of course, where is the earth going that's causing the asphalt to collapse.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it.

MR. ERIC MOE: So that's my whole opinion of being 1 2 up here. 3 And I want to thank both the township as well as 4 Joe for their concerns and spending time out there and trying 5 to figure this out here, especially for the last two years. 6 So I appreciate that and I understand how the process has to 7 work here. BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: 8 Okay. 9 The gentleman next to him? 10 MR. DAVID RUMPEL: My name is Dave Rumpel. 11 15324 State Road. 12 And one of the questions I would have, and mine is 13 some of the pictures that are up here, one of the questions I 14 have is is there confirmation that the culvert has been 15 compromised and collapsed? 16 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It's not 100 17 percent sure. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: They have not cameraed. 19 Is that what you're asking? Have they put a camera down? 2.0 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: We tried, but we 2.1 can't. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: You couldn't get it 23 through. 24 My lay opinion would be if you can't get a camera 25 through a culvert, it probably means the culvert is beginning to collapse, especially if it's 80 years old. That's a reasonable expectation for something like this.

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MR. DAVID RUMPEL: And that's what I heard lately or the last communication that I have was that the culvert had collapsed. And based on my research, that railroad went in service roughly 1857.

So is the culvert 140 years old roughly? Or is it 80 years old? We don't know.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: We don't know.

MR. DAVID RUMPEL: But it's collapsed. And so Wally Delemator (sic), if I'm saying his last name correctly, estimated that there is 30 to 50 million gallons of water that is backed up to Arthur Court and my property and neighborhood properties from this watershed from this drainage district.

So when that thing is plugged, and it keeps sinking from the bike path above, the old railroad grade, then obviously it creates a problem when the water backs up like that.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Understand.

MR. DAVID RUMPEL: So that's the only thing that I would say is that, yeah, the culvert is collapsed and it's an orphan drain. I've lived there for 21 years, it's never been maintained, it's never been a problem. I don't think it's been a problem for a hundred years or maybe 140 years. It's

always worked fine.

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It has nothing to do with the Lake Michigan water levels from my opinion, it's a collapsed culvert. And there is no where for the water to drain until it's fixed.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it.

MR. DAVID RUMPEL: It's an issue there that here we are today, and hopefully we have some sort of resolution as to how to fix the culvert.

That's all I've got, thank you.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And next to him? One more over?

MR. WARREN PRELESNIK: My name is Warren Prelesnik.

I live on Arthur Court and I'm on the board of Arthur Court.

We have about four of our owners that are affected by the drainage issue. And I think the last time it was up rather high, one of the them had water about ten feet from their back door, similar to what Mr. Moe had just indicated.

It's a problem for us obviously because we're going to have four of our units that are going to be destroyed or closed down or have some major issues.

So again it is the culvert. And that's the focus on what we're after is not only the culvert but, you know, think of it if the culvert does collapse totally and nothing is ever done because no one wants to takeover the control of the thing, you'll end up with flooding on State Road and

everywhere else down the line everywhere.

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Plus you have the added problem with the sewer line that goes through there because if the culvert does fully collapse, that sewer line will go with it and you're going to end up with raw sewage into the swamp behind our place; but also down into Lloyd's Bayou, which I don't think the state or any of you really want.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay, appreciate it.

MR. WARREN PRELESNIK: So we really need to have that fixed. However you do it, it is a community, we all have a part to play in living in a community to make it the desirable place that we want to live in.

Thank you.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Thank you.

Further down in that row? Anybody else that would like to speak?

I'm going to go back over to this side of the room, in the next row, is there anybody there that would like to speak?

MS. ALICIA CHANEY: Alicia Chaney. I'm at 17550 Woodland Lane, technically Crockery Township. I literally am the eastern most portion of this.

So first of all, I question whether my property even drains to the west. And secondly, so the culvert -- question, the culvert that is the problem is not currently in

the orphan drain that you have no control over, so why can 1 2 you not fix the culvert without including all of us in that 3 drain? 4 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: It is in the orphan drain, 5 the culvert is. 6 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: But the yellow part is the 7 current district, correct? ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Yes. 8 9 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: And the purple part is the 10 proposed district, correct? 11 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That is correct. 12 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: So the purple part is where the 13 culvert is? 14 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Correct. 15 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: So it's not in the orphan drain 16 that you have no control over so why can't you --17 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It's the opposite. The 18 purple is the orphan drain. 19 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: It is the orphan drain. 2.0 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: It says it's the proposed 2.1 district. 22 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Right. That's why 23 they're saying it is because if it was already within a 24 drainage district, they may not have to do an expansion. 25 problem is this culvert, the problem is not within a public

drain. So we can't use public monies to repair it. 1 2 So the purple -- if you look at this right now, the 3 purple would be what we are calling the orphan drain, and the 4 question is whether we bring the orphan drain into the public 5 realm. 6 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: Okay. But it's under the North 7 Bank Trail. So you're saying the North Bank Trail is 8 privately owned? 9 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: No. That's not what 10 we're saying. We're saying it's not part of the drainage 11 district. Now you can have public land within an orphan 12 13 drain, just as you can have private land within an orphan 14 drain. 15 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: Okay. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: The drainage district 17 is simply showing where the water course is that contributes 18 to the drainage district. 19 Is that correct, Lucas? 2.0 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That's correct. 2.1 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: So the expansion is so that 22 what can be accomplished? 23 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: From what I understand 2.4 right now we're only talking about necessity. 25 And so this committee is only looking at is there a

problem that needs to be corrected and solved. 1 2 And so right now the only problem we've heard about 3 so far is that we have a culvert that isn't part of the 4 drainage district. And so that's the question we have in 5 front of us, is that sufficient in terms of necessity to 6 expand the current Yonker Drain into the proposed Yonker 7 Drain. Does that make sense? BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Yes. 8 9 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: So I quess I will just go on 10 record saying I don't think my property should be included. 11 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And they will check your property. You gave your address, didn't you, so they 12 13 can verify it? 14 MS. ALICIA CHANEY: Yes. 15 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. Next? 16 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Natasha Dahl, and I own property 17 at 14508 State Road, a 35-acre parcel, 34-acre parcel. 18 And the creek runs right through what -- where the 19 property is, right through the middle of it. 2.0 We've been out there a lot and it appears that the 2.1 creek is flowing normally, so I do not believe that there is 22 a problem on that part of the drainage. 23 From some of the other testimonials we've heard, 24 there is a problem with the culvert. So it sounds like

something does need to be addressed with that culvert.

25

don't think that that necessarily means that we need to 1 2 designate that entire area as the Yonker Drain. 3 I think if we change the designation to take care 4 of only the problem, and not the rest of the area, I think 5 that sounds reasonable. 6 Do we have maps of the hundred year floodplain? 7 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: I did not bring one along, but the water levels backed up behind that dam are starting 8 9 to approach those levels, and that's what Mr. Rumpel had 10 mentioned too just with the high water levels. 11 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Are the houses and condos being 12 affected within that hundred year flood zone? 13 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Typically the homes, 14 when they're constructed, are constructed with their basement 15 level or lower level above the hundred years. 16 So he says it's approaching the hundred year level, 17 and that seems to confirm with what the condo owners have 18 said is it's beginning to approach their properties as far as 19 their structures. 2.0 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Okay. So the condos were not 2.1 constructed within the hundred year flood zone? 22 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That's correct. 23 MS. NATASHA DAHL: So right now no one currently 24 has authorization to replace or repair that culvert, is that 25 accurate?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: That is accurate. 1 2 MS. NATASHA DAHL: It's privately owned land? 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It's an orphan drain, 4 which means there has simply been no legal responsibility passed -- given to the drain commissioner to maintain it. 5 6 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Okav. 7 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It may not be privately 8 owned as far as an individual who is responsible for it. 9 fact right now we're saying nobody is responsible for it 10 because it's not part of a county drain system. 11 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Okay. And is that culvert, I'm not so familiar with the area since we don't live here yet, 12 13 do we -- is that area like where that culvert is, does that 14 go underneath a roadway or does it go just under the bike 15 path? 16 ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Underneath the bike path. 17 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Underneath the bike path. ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Which was an old railroad. 18 19 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Okay. All right. Perfect. 2.0 One concern that I have as a property owner is we 2.1 tried to be authorized to put a four-foot culvert in, and 22 went upstream and downstream of our property, our three-foot 23 culverts, and we were denied the ability to do that because 24 of the environmental impact on the wetland. They wanted us

to put a 60-foot expansion bridge across this tiny little

So I just feel like if 7 the problem is the culvert, then the drainage district should be designated around that culvert. I do not think that it 8 9 warrants expanding that drainage district to the entire area, 10 particular areas that are not affected, where the drainage 11 system, like what you would call the orphan district, where 12 that stream is. 13 If that stream is flowing correctly, which a lot of 14 people have testified that it is flowing normally, then I 15 don't think that it warrants designation of drainage 16 district. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I appreciate it. 18 MS. NATASHA DAHL: Thank you. 19 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. I'm going to go 2.0 across the aisle and the fourth row, back there. Anybody 2.1 want to speak? 22 MR. ROBERT LONDO: Hi. My name is Robert Londo, 23 L-O-N-D-O, 17854 - 136th avenue. 24 I thought I paid for this drain already by the 25 I think we ended up paying 400. But my parents Nunica area.

never paid for it before that and I guess they changed the way they do that now, and it's in that area. It seemed like it was a \$400 bill that time a few years back here. It's the one that was just previously -- but anyway I guess everybody is going back to this culvert.

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So if it comes to the culvert, are they going to start with the culvert and if that takes care of it, they're not going to continue on all the way to Lloyd's Bayou?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: From what I understand, and I've dealt with the Water Resources Commissioner for years, he's not looking to create a large project where a small solution can solve it.

And so I think we just have to go in there realizing that because he's an elected official, he has to be concerned about doing a project that is sized to the problem. We're not going to -- he shouldn't use a sledgehammer to deal with a mosquito, and same thing here.

If there is a simple solution, he'll go with the simple solution.

MR. ROBERT LONDO: Yeah. Because I kind of live on a ridge, got part of a ridge, it seems like a quarter mile away from the Yonker Drain and the neighbors beside me didn't have to pay for it, but they came off a quarter mile to get to me, and on the other side of the ridge is another stream. So I'm kind of hit on both --

1	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: You're on the edge.
2	MR. ROBERT LONDO: Yeah.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I understand.
4	MR. ROBERT LONDO: I just wanted to make sure it
5	was going for a good cause. And if it's it sounds like
6	the culvert is the big culprit. As you know, down by Lloyd's
7	Bayou the water levels were real high. It can't go any
8	higher than that to get out anyway.
9	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I understand.
10	MR. ROBERT LONDO: Thank you.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Again in that row,
12	anybody else that would like to make a comment?
13	MR. ROY LONDO: My name is Roy Londo. I live at
14	18010 - 136th.
15	I really don't know where my land even comes close
16	to this because my brother says there is a ditch on the other
17	side of me, that's where mine drains.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.
19	MR. ROY LONDO: But I don't have a water problem

12	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.
13	MS. JEANETTE MAGSIG: We know that there are new
14	buildings being built close to 148th Street. There is a new
15	subdivision going in.
16	We've been told that the culvert they're using on
17	148th Street is a seven-foot culvert. So it will be pushing
18	more water through.
19	We know that the culvert is backed up. We know
20	that the sewer line goes underneath it, and they did put
21	the a beam or something underneath it to support that
22	sewer drain.
23	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Yep.
24	MS. JEANETTE MAGSIG: But they did say it was
25	compromised.

Right now when the water goes up we have ducks swimming in back of our units, where there never was ducks before. We're really concerned that -- we don't mind looking at ducks, but we would mind looking at the raw sewage swimming in our backyard.

So please help us straighten out this drain issue

So please help us straighten out this drain issue because it's going to hurt more than us because it will be backing up more.

Thank you very much.

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BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. I'm going to go back to the next-to-the-last row on the right side. Anybody there that would like to speak?

MR. TROY WIERENGA: Troy Wierenga, at 14247 State Road.

I'm still trying to wrap my head around this due to the vague information that came from the mail and then getting online and seeing how things weren't right.

I just have a question, let's say that the culvert at the end of my driveway is collapsed. Is that my cost or is that the --

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Actually a driveway culvert would be your cost. You are actually permitted by the road commission to have that culvert in there, so you're responsible to maintain that culvert or the road commission could come in there and replace it.

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That actually is -- because it's within the road

               From what I can understand here, the yellow part on
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your map, we all paid an assessment two years ago and had 1 2 that drain all cleaned to 144th. And now it sounds like 3 we're trying to get it again. 4 I live just off from Woodland Lane, which is the 5 high part on State Road. If you come out there in a rain 6 storm you'll see the water run right down State Road, comes 7 right to my driveway and runs right into my yard. I have not done anything about it because basically 8 9 there is nothing you can do about it. The road is a 10 little -- the edge of the road is a little bit higher than 11 the pavement, so it runs down the pavement right into my 12 yard. So every time it rains, I have to go out and redo 13 14 my yard, my driveway. Because I have a lot of traffic in and 15 out, and every time they hit a hole, it blows a big hole. So 16 I mean as far as I'm concerned we've already paid our share. 17 Thank you. 18 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it. 19 And again, in the very last row, since you stood 2.0 up, I'm going to stay on this side of the room, that's fine. 21 MR. MATT RAY: Hi. My name is Matt Ray, I own the 22 property at 15175 Krueger Street. 23 I don't believe my property drains into this 24 district, if I could have that looked into. I believe it 25 drains to the south and the west.

But I am a user of the culvert because I use the bike path and I think everybody understands that the culvert is the issue here.

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The bike path is something that everybody in the community benefits from; and from what I'm hearing, that -- and what I see as I ride up along it is that bike path, that culvert is actually an earthen dam. And the district should actually be drawn for properties that feed into that culvert area. It should be limited by the earthen dam, not anything downstream of that.

And what I really think you're trying to do is you're trying to fix that culvert issue so you can drain out and find ways to pay for that.

If it's brought into the district that impacts that culvert, being north of that earthen -- or upstream of that earthen dam, would the rest of the community funds be able to pay for that?

Because what I'm seeing is the properties that are downstream of that earthen dam have no more impact on that culvert than one that's in Grand Haven or Chicago for that matter.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Well there is actually going to be impact because if they put in a culvert, it is going to have some impact on their drainage further downstream. Which is why they try to use drainage districts

that actually follow natural drainage districts.

2.0

MR. MATT RAY: How would that impact --

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Because if the water goes through it at a quicker pace and it isn't backed up, it could have an impact on them downstream. If they're --

MR. MATT RAY: But it's been draining through there all the time. What we're talking about is a failed culvert not a new culvert.

We're not talking about an increased drainage area, we're talking about the same size drainage area that needs a repair.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. Well again I think the other thing that's occurring here is we're saying this is an orphan drain. If a problem does occur, right now there is no mechanism to deal with it. Just like there is no mechanism to deal with this specific problem if there is something that occurs further downstream, there is nothing right now to deal with that problem either.

MR. MATT RAY: Yeah, but that stream, if you look at the topo maps, the impact downstream would impact Lake Michigan. So I think if we could have that redrawn looking at the impacted areas and the areas that are affecting the culvert, that would be correct.

And then if you could tell me whether or not, if it is redrawn that way, if the township funds could be used to

repair this culvert.

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BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: If the culvert is within a certified or identified county drain, public monies can be used to repair that drain.

MR. MATT RAY: Okay. So then I think the, in my view the equitable solution is to have it redrawn up to that culvert and then have the township and the others that utilize the bike path, which is the actual cause of the issue, to fund the repairs.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it.

MR. MATT RAY: Thank you.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I'm going to go on the -- one more person in the very back row there.

MR. ADAM BECK: Hi. Adam Beck, I'm on 144th just south of 104.

A couple of concerns. First off, I sympathize with Arthur Court and those folks, obviously they have an issue that's manmade. The railroad bed, the bike path, all that and the culvert are a result of impeding the natural flow which has created this issue. So I sympathize with them and understand that this has to be taken into the drain system so that there is authority to repair it.

My concern lies a little more with if we deal with this drain and create more watershed, we've not been provided with a topo, we can't see what happens further down towards

Lloyd's Bayou with that increased volume of water. Is that then going to back the drains back up and create more water in other areas, especially with our historic high water and Lloyd's Bayou being high.

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So that would be one of my concerns, not having the topo --

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And that's one of the things they can do after the Board of Determination. The Water Resources Commissioner doesn't look just at the specific problem, but also has to look downstream to see how the solution is going to affect the other properties owners.

Right now he doesn't have the authorization to do that.

MR. ADAM BECK: I understand that. And then the other thing that I'm concerned about or questioning is I've done some developing and I've had to have retention ponds and handle my drainage on site. So it would seem to me that the developer of Arthur Court should have had retention ponds adequate to handle their water runoff.

So I'm a little concerned why folks upstream of this culvert then are expecting the whole community to pay for what the developer probably should have foreseen or been required to meet for drainage.

I'm not against helping our neighbors, but it seems to me why am I paying now when I have to pay for my own, and

1	I had to have my own retention ponds, now why am I paying to
2	correct a problem.
3	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Do they detain all the
4	water on your site or do they also allow it to be released
5	after a certain point?
6	MR. ADAM BECK: No, it's detained.
7	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: All of it on site?
8	Because typically what happens in the county is that not all
9	the water is detained on site, rather it is delayed on site
10	before the release is made.
11	MR. ADAM BECK: Into the ground, but I'm not
12	allowed to drain into the drain.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.
14	MR. ADAM BECK: So I'm concerned about that, why am
15	I footing the bill to correct the developer's issue.
16	Again, I sympathize with them and I know they have
17	a problem, but I think it lies more in the developer's lap
18	for not meeting the 100-year retention. So those are my
19	concerns.
20	I'd love to see a topo. I'd love to see if this is
21	then going to back up and create a bigger problem for me if
22	I'm not allowed to drain.
23	So thank you for your time.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate it.
25	And I know we're feeding into the next public

hearing that we have scheduled, so I'm going to go to the very back section of this left-hand side of the room. Is there anybody there that would like to speak? If you could come up and give your name and address.

MR. CHIP FRANCKE: My name is Chip Francke, F-R-A-N-C-K-E, 17270 Quail Creek Drive.

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When I first got this letter, I was concerned that maybe this was somehow related to the new subdivision on the north side of State Road. But after doing some research and talking to some people, I was told that, no, that there is nothing that's -- all that water that's going to drain from the new subdivision is going into the appropriate drainage district which is up to Spring Lake eventually.

There is a very small portion along State Road that looks like it's in this drainage district, but that didn't seem to be a problem.

So the reasons that I got from the people that I talked to, they did say the culvert, and then I didn't know that there was flooding going on, but it sounds like that that's related to this culvert issue, is that correct?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: From the testimony I've heard today, I believe that is what the main issue is we've heard.

MR. CHIP FRANCKE: Okay. Quail Creek runs on the edge of my property. And I believe the gentleman, one of the

gentleman back here said that we shouldn't call it an orphan 1 2 drain, it's a natural creek. And I believe Quail Creek is 3 just another name for this creek, is that correct? BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I'm not familiar with 4 5 the name Quail Creek. 6 Are you? 7 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It's called Ouail 8 Creek. 9 MR. CHIP FRANCKE: It's called a bunch of different 10 things but Quail Creek is one of the things it's called. 11 I know the people in the back are having a hard 12 I don't know if this is on. time hearing. 13 We have -- the only time we've -- we have the 14 100-year flood line running right through the middle of my 15 property according to the surveys and stuff that I have. And 16 the only time we've had water pool up in our backyard was 17 when the water tables were higher. And just because the 18 water table was higher we have a low spot and there was 19 water. 2.0 We haven't had any water back up from flooding in 21 our property or any of the others along Quail Creek Drive 22 that I know of. 23 And Quail Creek, it's a natural stream. We have 24 coyotes and fox and turkeys, all kinds of different birds

that migrate through there and feed and rest and nest.

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It's a really nice natural area. And one of my concerns is I want to keep it that way.

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It seems to me that designating this as a county drain is a little bit of an overkill for this problem.

Because I know through -- I worked for Ottawa County for quite a few years with the parks department, and we dealt with drain issues in different parks. And I know that once a drain is designated as a county drain that gives, and correct me if I'm wrong, somebody, but that gives the county the right to go in there, clear vegetation, clear debris, deepen it, widen it, straighten it, and, you know, some of the --

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Again it would only allow them if they have authority from the state. And you have to remember, they would only clear vegetation or clear logs if it's causing flooding further upstream.

MR. CHIP FRANCKE: Yeah. But that's my concern.
BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.

MR. CHIP FRANCKE: It just seems like -- it doesn't sound like there is a big flooding problem except for the few individuals, but that's because of the culvert problem.

And it just seems like, again, it's overkill to designate the whole drain a county drain and open it up to possible development in the future.

Isn't there some kind of a variance or a permit, and maybe even grant money that we can just deal with that

one problem without having -- are there other options? 1 2 the only option to get that culvert fixed is to designate 3 this whole thing a county drain? Or could there be other 4 options out there that have not been investigated? 5 And that's what I wanted to know. 6 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Appreciate your 7 comment. 8 In the back row? 9 MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA: My name is Jerry Van 10 I have three parcels, 104, 14281 M-104, 16884 Eizenga. 11 144th Avenue. I have another parcel that's adjacent to that, 12 I just -- my mother's house, I couldn't remember -- but 13 anyway. 14 None of my water is affected by the Yonker Drain. 15 I'm below the railroad grade, and so none of my water is 16 affected. 17 My water does get affected by the Grand Trunk drain to the east. I'm on 104, I got about 30 acres. And also my 18 19 water drains to the west, which ends up in the orphan drain. 2.0 Now as I understand it that without a designated 2.1 drain district you're not going to get anything cleaned out. 22 So if we -- if the proposed Yonker Drain is annexed into the 23 orphan drain, everybody will pay, every tax payer will pay to 24 have anything done in that district, is that correct? 25 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: That's not correct.

For instance, if they're doing the Drain Commissioner -excuse me, the Water Resources Commissioner is authorized to
spend 5,000 per mile per drain for typical maintenance such
as clearing out logs and so forth that might be blocking the
natural stream.

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The other thing he would be able to do is to go to the local municipality, as I had mentioned earlier, and have small projects paid a hundred percent by them. So every time work is done does not necessarily mean that there is going to be an assessment.

If there is an assessment, it is something that you would be made aware of.

MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA: I understand that because the Grand Trunk drain doesn't really affect me because there is a 20-foot high ridge that runs east and west, and my water doesn't -- well percentage, doesn't -- the majority of my water does not perk into the Grand Trunk drain, but everybody pays when it comes time to clean it.

If the proposed Yonker Drain is not annexed into the orphan drain, it sounds like the county or the state or the district could raise their own money to fix the drain, and it wouldn't have to be assessed on everybody, or anybody. Is that correct?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I don't think that's correct because how would they raise the money if there is no

assessment district there? I don't know the mechanism you 1 2 would use. 3 Are you saying you'd go around voluntarily asking 4 people to pay money and hire a contractor to go on private 5 property? 6 MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA: What I'm saying is we No. 7 know the drain under the railroad grade needs to be repaired. BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: 8 Yes. 9 MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA: And if we do not annex it, 10 the Yonker Drain into that district, who is going to fix it? BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Nobody. Because there 11 is no authorization for them to go onto this property. They 12 13 don't have the easements, they don't have anything to do it. 14 MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA: But I thought previously 15 you said the township or the county or something could get 16 monies for that. 17 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: If it's part of the 18 Yonker Drain, and it is then a part of the public drain 19 If it's part of the public drain system, then they system. 2.0 can spend public monies to repair it. 2.1 If it's not part of the public drain system, we 22 refer to it as an orphan drain and technically you're not 23 supposed to spend any public monies on repairing an orphan 24 drain.

I understand.

MR. JERRY VAN EIZENGA:

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1 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: 2 The very back row on the, what is my left side of 3 the room? Okay. 4 Has anybody not spoken that would like to speak? 5 If you've already spoken -- okay. I have one individual in 6 the very back. 7 MR. DALE TEN BRINK: My name is Dale Ten Brink. 8 I'm at 4191 Fruitport Road. And I'm also the owner of Equity 9 Marine Construction so I'm a little bit familiar with some of 10 this type of work, and elevations and stuff like that. 11 My concern is that the green area which is proposed 12 just north of M-104, which looks like a swamp lowland, it 13 would be interesting to know what the elevation is of that 14 area compared to Lloyd's Bayou, because you're really not 15 going to get any change in that area. 16 You can dig it all you want if the DEO will let you 17 dig it --18 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: 19 MR. DALE TEN BRINK: You can drain Lake Michigan, 2.0 that's the only thing that's going to help it. 2.1 So my concern is the contributory creeks that come 22 into that area, that has the same elevation as Lloyd's Bayou 23 really isn't going to get changed, which a lot of these areas 24 are connected to. They're getting assessed for this and

they're not going to get any elevation change unless you

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drain Lake Michigan.

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So I feel that those contributories that come into that area or that elevation, the same, really doesn't pertain to it.

It's pretty obvious we got a problem with a culvert, where the railroad track bike path was. I'd be interested to find out if the construction of the bike path had anything to do with that. And if so, I would suggest that the funding for this bike path, which they're working on right now in Nunica, be put on hold to find out if the funds need to go to take care of this.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: From what I understand this is an existing culvert with -- on a railroad track, meaning that the pathway, which was created how many years ago, Gordon?

 $\label{township} \mbox{ Manager Gordon Gallagher:} \\ \mbox{ Eight to ten.}$

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Eight to ten, the problem apparently developed just recently, and before that you had a railroad track and railroad.

Again you're talking about a drain that's 80 years old at the youngest end of the spectrum, it could be 140 years old. So that's probably not impacted because the elevation from the bike path above that is, from what I understand, about 14 feet?

4	would doubt that a pathway would impact a

8	eight to ten years and the problem existed this year, so
9	again it's doubtful. But regardless, that's not an option
10	that's available.

13	to say, yeah, that could happen.
14	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: It's a good question.
15	If it was, we go back to I know if the township believed
16	that the bike path contractor contributed or damaged the
17	culvert, that they would go after them, just as I would as a
18	manager.
19	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: Okay. That was just a
20	thought. Like I said, I haven't seen the site.
21	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay.
22	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: Another thing that I would say
23	is, like I say, if the elevation is the key thing, and I
24	think each and everyone of us here ought to have a topo
25	survey provided to us for a meeting like this to know where

we're impacted. Like the one fellow says there is a 15-foot drop from 144th Street.

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Well obviously, anything down there isn't going to change or affect them people in Nunica if there already is a drop.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And that's one of the things that if they did go with an assessment roll for this they don't just look at a flat rate based per acre. They look at benefit, they look at how much water is being contributed. They look at how much impervious surfaces are there.

So don't just make an assumption that is being made that because you're within the district you're going to necessarily be assessed some large amount for any solution to a problem that has been testified to today.

Is that a fair statement, Joe?

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's fair.

MR. DALE TEN BRINK: Well it sounds like we don't really have anything to say much after this unless we appeal it in court?

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Well the drain commissioner is going to listen to the concerns before he even puts an assessment roll together, if an assessment roll is even created.

Right now the question is is there a problem that

1	needs to have a solution. That's the necessity we're talking
2	about right now.
3	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: Okay. Well it's definitely a
4	problem, sounds like a culvert problem.
5	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: I agree with that
6	statement, a hundred percent.
7	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: I guess what I would like to
8	add is the green area there, I would dare and say there is a
9	good half of that is going to be in that swamp and I doubt
10	that the DEQ is going to let you do any work on that anyhow.
11	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: That may be very true.
12	That may absolutely be correct.
13	Typically they would only allow work in those areas
14	if it was causing problems further upstream.
15	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: So I guess what I'm looking at
16	is a lot of these contributories all congregate in that area.
17	So really anything done above that elevation should pertain
18	to these other people that have contributories
19	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: If it is approved as a
20	necessity, if the Board determines there is a necessity,
21	we'll also be asking the drain commissioner to reevaluate the
22	boundaries based on the comments from today's meeting.
23	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: Okay.
24	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Fair enough?
25	MR. DALE TEN BRINK: And I think elevation is key.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Elevation is key. 1 2 one of the keys, I agree with that. 3 At this stage we've taken comments for this so I'm 4 going to close the public comment portion of the meeting and 5 open it up for board discussion that we have. 6 I'll let Ken go first and see if you have any 7 questions or comments for us. BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I don't think I have --8 9 to me, it sounds like we have a single area that needs to be 10 addressed. However, that single area is not within public 11 drain district. 12 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Yes. 13 BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: And the only way we can 14 get the drain commissioner so he can work on it is to 15 designate this whole thing as county drain. 16 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Yes. 17 BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I think that if that 18 drain did plug, totally, that no water could get through 19 there, everybody upstream would have a problem. 2.0 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: If it plugged up, yes, 21 I agree. 22 BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: So to alleviate the 23 problem, the drain commissioner needs to have a drain 24 district established. I see that as -- that's the way I see 25 this problem.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Rich, do you have any comments?

BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Just that I agree with what Ken said.

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I do think that it's very clear that one problem has been identified and that's the problem of the culvert.

And therefore it seems to me that to determine the necessity would be appropriate from my point of view.

And also based on what you said a moment ago, Bill, to determine the scope of the project, and that of course would be done by the Water Resources Commissioner.

So those are my comments.

BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And I tend to agree. What we're looking for is a very narrow question here and the question is is there a problem that is related to storm drainage. And does that problem, is it sufficient that there should be a public solution to that problem.

In this case, I don't see that there could be a private solution. So the only option available is to work through the Ottawa County Water Resources Commission.

To do that, we would need to correctly identify the district. The district that is identified in yellow right now on the maps is obviously insufficient and may have been done for a very narrow focus at least 70 years ago, it sounds like, maybe greater.

1	And so I'm also of the opinion that there is a
2	necessity in terms of this public drain.
3	So that said, if there is a motion in support of
4	that, I would appreciate it if it could be offered.
5	BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Mr. Chairman, I
6	would make the motion that the maintenance and improvement of
7	the Yonker Drain is necessary and conducive to the public
8	health, convenience or welfare.
9	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll second that.
10	BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: I'll make that
11	motion.
12	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll second that.
13	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And last opportunity
14	for any comments before we vote? Any comments?
15	And again, then I will call the question all in
16	favor, say aye.
17	BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Aye.
18	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Aye.
19	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
20	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Opposed?
21	And that was actually on the motion, that wasn't on
22	calling the question, if somebody gets too technical as to
23	what we were doing there.
24	Then do we have any other motions that we would
25	typically offer at this stage with regard to instructions on

the drainage -- the district itself? 1 2 BOARD SECRETARY RICH VANDER KLOK: Not really. 3 think the Water Resources Commissioner may want to talk about 4 the appeal process. 5 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: We can do that. 6 The other thing I do want to say for the record is 7 that we are asking the Water Resources Commissioner based on the comments today to reevaluate and look at the actual 8 district boundaries and the properties included. 10 Up to this point they've only done it by the 11 elevation maps which may be fairly accurate, but sometimes 12 the field work, which they weren't actually authorized to do 13 up to this point, needs to be done where they will go into 14 the field and verify that. 15 That said, I think we are ready to turn this back 16 over before we adjourn briefly, to the Water Resources 17 Commissioner. 18 Joe? 19 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thank you, Mr. 2.0 Chair. You can appeal today's hearing. You have ten days 2.1 22 from today if you want to appeal the hearing with probate 23 court. So that's an opportunity that you can do. 24 And also I appreciate everybody's time and

comments.

1	We will have the engineering firm contact several
2	of you folks who were kind of curious if you were in or out
3	of the drain district, so look forward to a phone call from
4	Prein & Newhof. And I appreciate your patience today. Thank
5	you.
6	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: And in that case we
7	will adjourn the meeting at this time.
